Water Rate:

There will be an increase effective January 1, 2025; you will see the increase on your April 1st billing.

\$45.00 base rate plus \$6.25 per 1,000 gallons of usage

Examples: \$45.00 base rate + 2,000 gallons usage = \$57.50 quarterly water bill

\$45.00 base rate + 8,000 gallons usage = \$95.00 quarterly water bill

NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS AND TENANTS:

to ensure that water is paid.*

*If/when a tenant's account becomes delinquent,
a bill will be sent to the property owner for payment.*

Water Leaks - Early detection of water leaks is key, and will save the customer money and can avert a potential disaster. Following is a list of simple checks homeowners can do to detect leaks:

1. **Water Meter Check** - One of the best ways to detect a water leak is to check the water meter. Turn off all the water in your home; shut off all faucets; ensure the dishwasher and washing machine are not running. Watch the meter; if it changes, you may be experiencing a leak.
2. **Usage** - Be aware of your average usage and if it is substantially higher, a leak is possible.
3. **Bill Monitoring** - If your bill is consistently rising but your water habits remain unchanged, a leak could be possible.
4. **Surface Water** - Check your property regularly for surface water on the interior and exterior of your home. Puddles can be a sign of leaks.
5. **Toilet Food Coloring Test** - To check a toilet for leaks, place some food coloring in the toilet tank. Wait 10 minutes; if the color goes into the toilet bowl, you have a leak.
6. **Noise** - Some leaks can be identified by a hissing noise.
